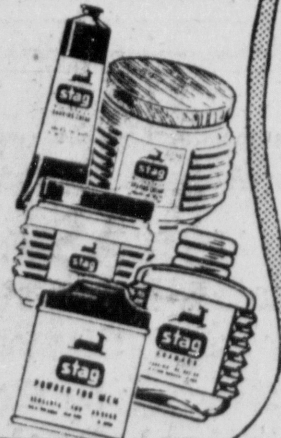

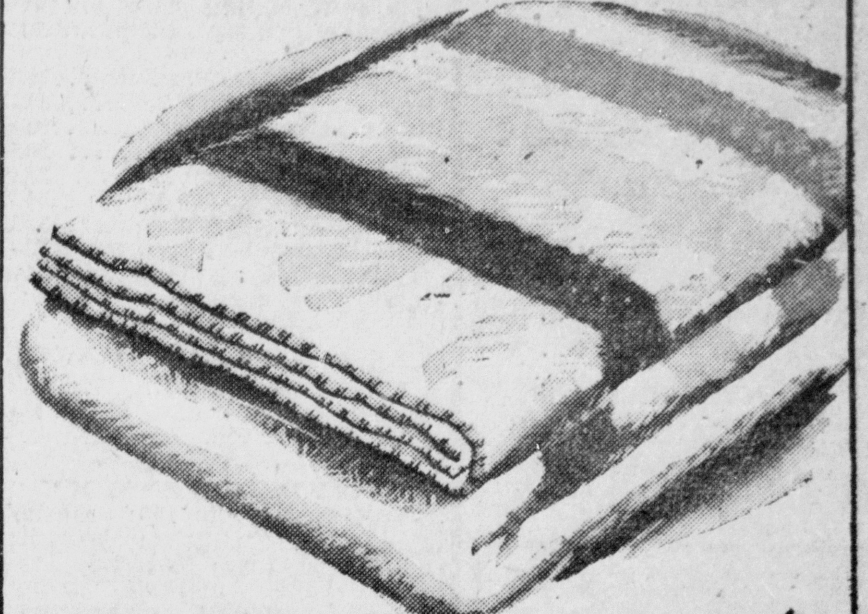

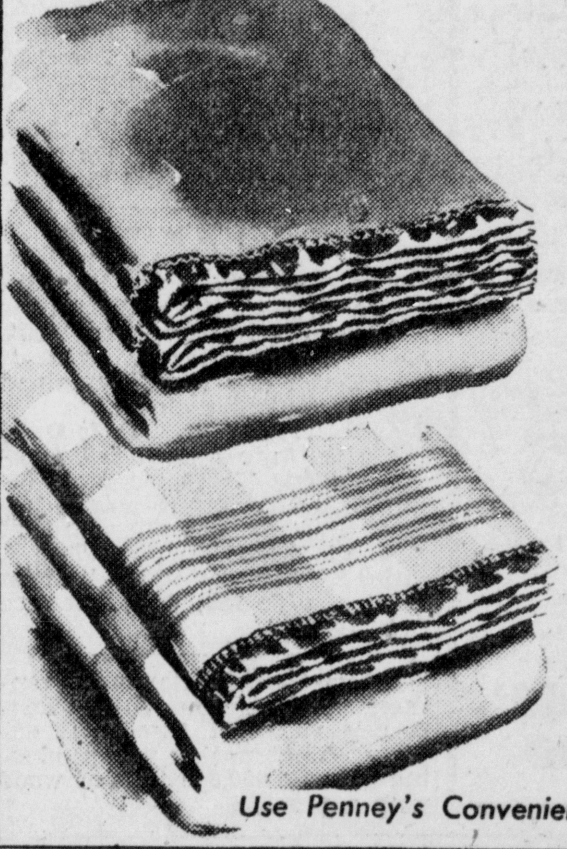
NEW POW BRANCH CAMP
