

Santa Claus Plans Two Special Visits For Delphos Youngsters

Annual Pre-Christmas Trip Here Will be Saturday Afternoon at 2 O'clock — Christmas Eve Visit Letter Deadline Too is Saturday.

Two visits to Delphos by Santa Claus during the next two weeks are scheduled, according to reports received here today. The "jolly old fellow" is slated to make his annual pre-Christmas visit to Delphos kiddies next Saturday afternoon, December 15. Santa said he would arrive about two p.m. and plans are being made by the local Chamber of Commerce to have an escort consisting of the St. John and Jefferson high school bands, the fire department and police, meet and accompany him on a parade through the business district. He also stated that he would have a special treat for each of the youngsters who come uptown to see him.

Santa Claus is then slated to return to Delphos on Christmas Eve, December 24, for special visits to the homes of youngsters who have written him a letter requesting the visit, Santa said. They must be post marked no later than Saturday, December 15th.

RED CROSS AID HUNGARIANS

As many as 35,000 refugees expected to need help — Mrs. George Horine asks help of local citizens.

Mrs. George Horine, chairman of the Delphos Chapter of the American Red Cross, reports that the Red Cross is doing a role in the Hungarian refugee care in Austria to a point that requires about support of the American people.

Additional teams of American Red Cross disaster specialists are being sent to Austria to operate and give added leadership to the refugee relief program in which it is anticipated the Red Cross will have direct responsibility for the emergency needs of as many as 35,000 refugees at a time throughout the winter months. In addition to this large scale effort abroad the whole operation at Camp Kilmer — consisting of welfare services, communications, clothing,

and other essentials is being expanded to meet the needs of 21,500 refugees with sixty staff members and 250 to 300 volunteers working three shifts daily.

The Red Cross, Mrs. Horine said, has been careful not to ask the people for funds until it was deemed absolutely necessary. With the rapid growth of the Austrian Relief Program it is important that the appeal for \$5,000,000 be contributed.

Mrs. Horine is urging local citizens to contribute to the needs of the refugees and to leave their contributions at either of the local banks before Christmas.

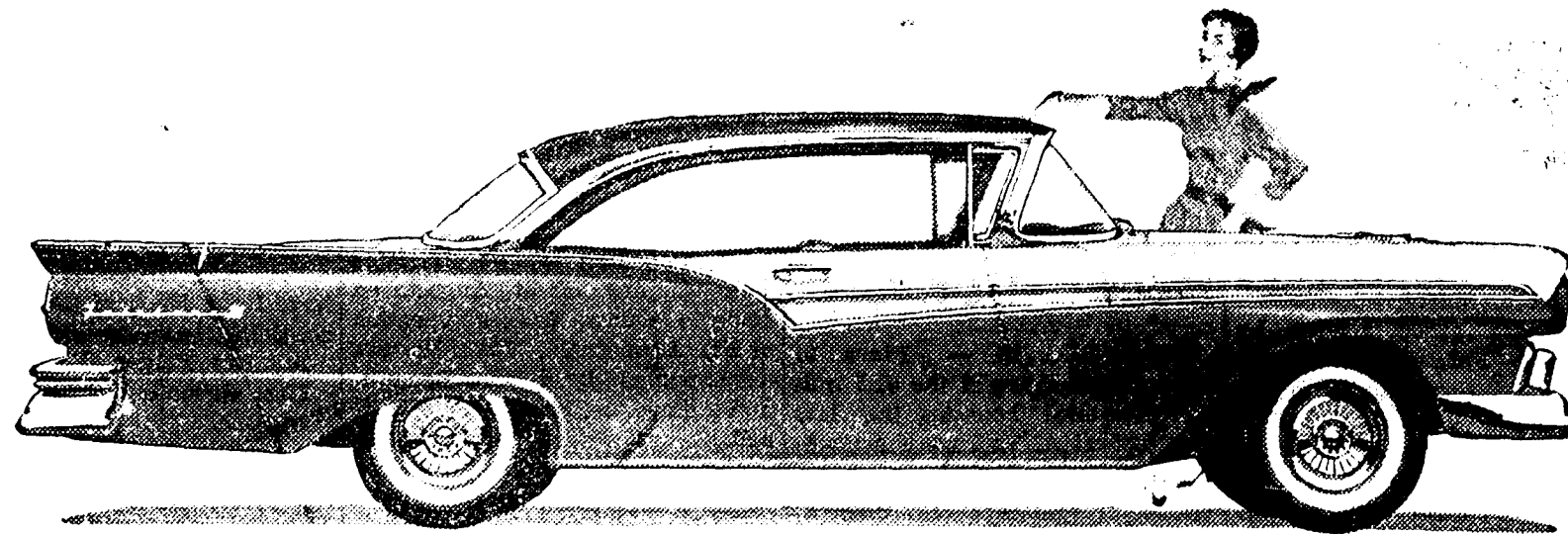

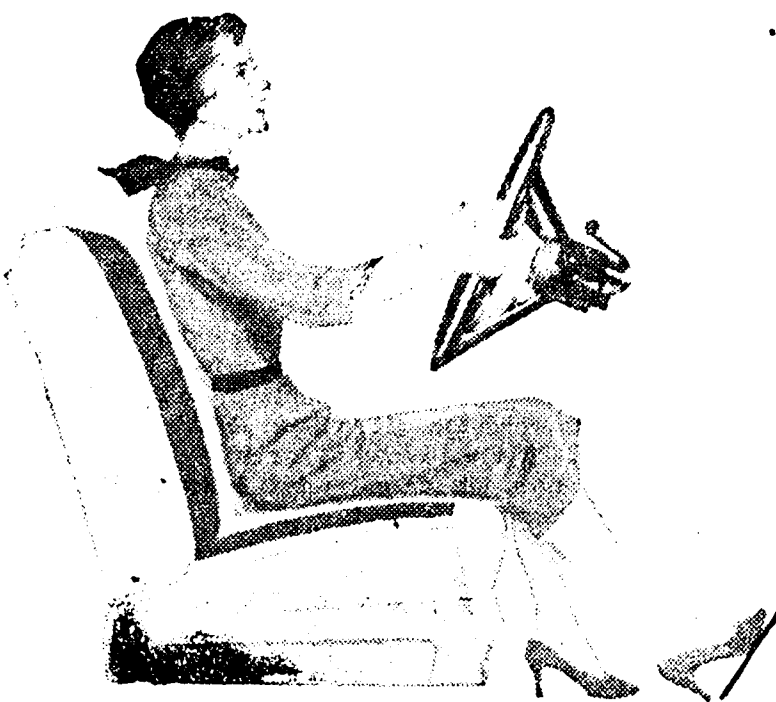
