Weekend Accidents Injure Six Persons

Six persons were hurt, and five drivers cited to traffic court, in five accidents investigated by police over the weekend.

Two persons were injured and a driver arrested in a four-car accident in the 100 block of North Cable Road, at 4:55 p.m. Friday.

Police said the car driven by Mildred Westrick, 68 Sherwood Ct., was stopped in traffic and was bumped from behind by an auto driven by John Dally Jr., 1901 Wendell.

An automobile driven by Alma Wise, 51 Sherwood Ct., hit the Dally car when she apparently failed to stop in time.

Debris apparently flew from one of the three cars, striking the right front fender of an automobile driven by Naomi Cummings, Rt. 1, Wapakoneta.

Dally and Mrs. Wise sustained minor injuries. Mrs. Wise was cited for failing to stop within an assured clear distance ahead.

Danny Newland, 17, of Wapakoneta, suffered a minor neck injury when his auto rammed the rear of a car driven by Wanda Donovan, 821 Weadock, in the 200 block of South Metcalf at 5:25 p.m. Friday. Newland was cited for failing to stop within an assured distance ahead.

A two-vehicle accident at

Wayne and Union at 2:45 a.m. Saturday caused injury to three persons and a driver was cited for disregarding a red light.

Police said an automobile driven by Michael Cheek, 18, of Bowling Green, hit the side of a car driven by Milburn Basinger, 45, of Bluffton, injuring both drivers and a passenger in the Basinger car.

Basinger was southbound on Union, entering the intersection when, officers said, the Cheek auto struck his car. Cheek said he was looking for highway signs and drove through the red light.

George Brown, 57, of 422 E. Pearl, was cited for reckless operation after his auto slammed into a telephone pole, injuring his passenger, Joseph Johnson, 448 E. Pearl. The accident happened in front of 425 N. Pine, at 2:25 p.m. Saturday.

James Shafer, 51, of 4390 New Haven Dr., was cited for speed in excess of road conditions after his car hit two poles in the 800 block of East High at 2:52 p.m. Saturday. He sustained cuts and bruises, according to police.

Toll Below Average 16 Persons Killed On Ohio Highways

Ohio's traffic death toll grew slowly but steadily over the weekend with the majority of fatal accidents taking one life each.

Only one multiple death accident was reported as the death toll mounted to at least 16 lives during the 6 p.m. Friday-midnight Sunday period.

Among the victims were three young children struck by cars.

The fatalities since Saturday:

Charles Walcott, 6, Forestville, a Cincinnati suburb, when he darted into traffic and was struck by an auto.

Baxter O'Bryan, 28, Rt. 2, Waverly, when his car crashed on Ohio 722 in Pike County.

Theodore F. Olszewski, 11, a result of head and leg injuries sustained in a car-motorcycle accident, when he ran into a street and was struck by a car.

Robert E. Heard, 50, Springfield, when her car veered off a Clark County road and struck a tree.

James Madden, 25, Dayton, died of injuries suffered a few hours earlier in a two-car crash south of Fairborn.

Stafford Williamson, 39, and Eugene Trawick, 44, both of Cleveland, when a car carrying six persons hit a utility pole on Cleveland's East Side.

Cincinnati Troubles Over, National Guardsmen Leaving

CINCINNATI (UPI) — Most of the 1,000 Ohio National Guardsmen who patrolled racially-troubled areas here the past five days today went back to their civilian jobs.

"Most of the guard has been pulled out," a police spokesman said. "Some are still here on standby, but they haven't been on the streets since Saturday night."

Police reported a routine Sunday night with "a little of everything, but nothing extra." It was the fourth quiet night since guardsmen in jeeps mounting machine guns restored order in the wake of burning and looting that erupted last Monday.

"It appears to be over," the spokesman said, but noted that police patrols remained "doubled up" and police were still on 12-hour shifts.

In Dayton, some 40 miles to the northwest, bone-weary police Sunday went off the 12-hour on, 12-hour off status they had assumed after violence broke out on the west side Wednesday night.

"We have a few extra men out, but basically it's normal," said Dayton Police Lt. Paul Stewart. "It appears to be a normal Sunday night."

Rock-throwing gangs of young Negroes went on a rampage through Dayton's west-side Negro ghetto Wednesday night following a fiery speech by black-power advocate H. Rap Brown.

Officials of both Dayton and Cincinnati said they planned to bring charges of criminal syndicalism against Brown, who is executive director of the Student Non-Violent Co-ordinating Committee.

"There seems to be an agreement on the part of the county prosecutors here and in Cincinnati that there is sufficient evidence to warrant a filing of charges," said Dayton Police Capt. Grover O'Connor.

Stewart said Sunday no charges had yet been filed and that it was believed Brown was out of the state.

In his Dayton speech Brown urged a crowd of about 200 to follow the example of Cincinnati Negroes and "take the pressure off Cincinnati."

The next day he went to Cincinnati and Thursday night warned the city would be "in flames until the hunkie cops (guardsmen) get out."

"It's obvious that he came here to breathe new life into these disorders," said Cincinnati Police Chief Jacob Schott.

Guardsmen and beefed-up police patrols restored order to Cincinnati's Avondale section last Thursday. Total damage from looting, rock-throwing and arson was more than \$2 million.

Dayton officials credit police with preventing widespread rioting by taking a firm stand against lawbreakers as soon as trouble started Wednesday night.

They also give credit to the "white hats," a squad of young Negroes who went through the trouble area Friday and Saturday nights urging other Negro teenagers to stay calm.

The plan was first used in Tampa, Fla., earlier last week and Cincinnati police officials think such a system might be useful here.

Meanwhile, city officials here suspended David McPheeters Jr., executive director of the Human Relations Commission, McPheeters, a Negro, was absent from the city last Monday, Tuesday and most of Wednesday.

"An evaluation of his performance will be made, including among other things, his absence from town during the critical situation facing the city and the commission," said Commission Chairman Robert Black.

Northern Launches Program

ADA — The board of trustees of Ohio Northern University are announcing a five-year Centennial Development program of \$6,910,000 to meet capital needs including a Basic Science Building, an Engineering Building and a Law Building.

The program will also provide for the completion of the financing for the Pharmacy Building, and the Heterick Library which will be completed in early 1968. Harold Meredith, Lima, board chairman, said.

Provision is also made for the remodeling and improvement of some existing buildings, development of site and roads, and current operational needs for the five-year period as well as increase in endowment.

This five-year goal is exclusive of funds which have recently been committed to Ohio Northern by the Methodist Crusade for higher education and exclusive also of loans and grants from the government.

In identifying sources for the financing of the program, Samuel L. Meyer, university president, noted that the University would look primarily to the 11,000 alumni of Ohio Northern. He said "it is to those who attended this fine university, and who best know and appreciate its worth that we must turn. There are lawyers, engineers, teachers, pharmacists, and a host of others who have gained their professional training at Ohio Northern, and we count on their loyalty to assist their alma mater in upgrading its academic program."

'Cycle Disturbance Leads To 44 Arrests

AKRON, Ohio (AP) — Two highway signs officers found at Twinsburg policemen ducked the grove.

Portage County sheriff's deputies reported they arrested 16 motorcycle club members late Sunday night on charges of contributing to the delinquency of minors after some juvenile girls were found with the motorcycles.

The arrests took place at the intersection of Ohio 43 and U.S. 224 about 15 miles southwest of Patonema.

Deputies said they confiscated several chains, daggers, and other small weapons from the motorcycleists, but no guns were found.

Officers said they did not know whether these arrested were part of the group involved in the throwing of rocks and bottles at two Twinsburg policemen early Sunday.

Police are holding as evidence a collection of knives, cigars, black leather jackets, a Nazi flag, road signs and the 22-caliber pistol.

More than 50 policemen from 24 surrounding communities responded to a call for help from Twinsburg police Sgt. Donald W. Plance and patrolman Walter Orent. The two officers got to the scene first after persons in the area complained of noise.

"We were belted with rocks and bottles from the woods and weeds," Plance said. "We made a circuit and called for help."

Some of the arrests occurred in an out-gate and that ended the disturbance.

The clubs include various members of the 24 cities at the time of a surrounding cities and were assigned to the one of two political parties — Federalist and Nationalist.

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Novel Promises 'Expose' Of Louisiana Government

COLUMBUS (UPI) — Gordon Novel said today he would launch an "expose" of Louisiana's state government unless state officials act against New Orleans District Atty. Jim Garrison.

Novel said he hoped Louisiana officials would be moved to act against Garrison by a network television show he said would be aired tonight.

"As of tonight I'm finished with this unless the political officials of Louisiana fail to take action against Mr. Garrison," Novel said.

Novel, a New Orleans native, has been living here ever since Garrison named him as a material witness in the assassination conspiracy investigation.

Louisiana officials are attempting to extradite him to face charges connected with the alleged burglary of munitions at an oil well company explosives dump in Houma, La.

Novel also previously said he had been in the employ of a national news-gathering organization.

Novel said tonight's show would be a special White Paper report on the National Broadcasting Co. network.

Garrison has filed a complaint against the National Broadcasting Co. with the Federal Communications Commission for allegedly "interfering" with his investigation.

"Whatever the motivation might be, it is clear that the National Broadcasting Co. has as its objective the total destruction of the pending investigation into the assassination of President Kennedy," Garrison said in a letter of complaint.

Novel said he returned to Saturday from a "sneak visit" to New Orleans to pick up some of his possessions.

"I would like to settle down in Columbus and open a Playmate-type nightclub," he said. "I am not guilty of any crime and know nothing of any assassination."

Novel first came here last March because his former girlfriend, Abby Mulligan, lived here with her family.
