**Girl Tossed Out Of Car And Run Over**

**LOS ANGELES, March 4** — Before she fainted from critical injuries, a young girl told police today a motorist tried to murder her by throwing her from his car on busy Wilshire Boulevard and then running his car over her "three or four times."

Miss Pauline Friedman, 26, who refused to name the driver of the car, was taken to a receiving hospital with head and internal injuries.

Witnesses chased the car until they lost it in traffic. A few minutes later the police arrested Irwin L. Diamond, 24, as he was parking his car a few blocks from the scene.

Diamond was booked on suspicion of assault with intent to commit murder.

Officers said he refused to answer questions, saying only: "I don't know how she got in the car or why I ran over her."

Bloodstains were found on the bumpers of his car, police said.

At Denver, Abraham Diamond said his son, Irwin went to the West Coast six weeks ago. He said the son was a student at the University of Colorado until two years ago and then was confined to a Denver sanatorium from July to September of 1951.

**YONKERS, N.Y., March 4** — Taking the motorman out of the trolley car apparently is easier than taking the trolley car out of the motorman.

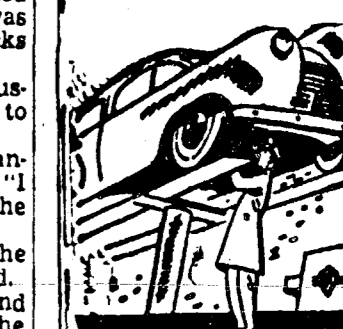
