

### Schools Living in Past Should Produce Competent Citizens Claim

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J. (UPI) — The trouble with America's schools, according to a distinguished British observer, is that they are living in the past. This criticism may surprise Americans who are accustomed to blaming "progressive" modern methods for all the ills of U. S. education. It is, however, the considered view of Prof. Denis W. Brogan of Cambridge University, a peppy and perceptive critic of American life who is sometimes called "the foreigner who knows America best."

Brogan is on his 31st or 32nd

visit to America (he has lost count of the exact number). He is delivering a series of lectures at Rutgers University here on "The American Crisis."

Part of that education crisis, he believes, lies in the failure of U. S. schools to respond to the new challenge that was not broganed from them. It is, however, the considered view of Prof. Denis W. 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### Television Review Nuremberg Trials Covers Wide Range

NEW YORK (UPI)—CBS-TV's Nuremberg trial coverage last Thursday night, perhaps too good a chunk for a 90-minute drama. But it must be judged as dramatic as the trial itself.

"Judgment at Nuremberg" succeeded in catching the heart for its full span.

It's strange that a play about the German war trials should strike me as courageous and bold 45 years after World War II, but this is a pretty pretty turkey word and the ball has taken some peculiar bounces. As "Judgment at Nuremberg" pointed out, I. G. Farben is now on our side and history, indeed, does run a curious course.

As for "Judgment at Nuremberg" Alby Mann's deal with the trial of four German jurists and within its frame it touched upon a question that most contend to have all contemporary men: the responsibility of the individual must bear the burden of the crimes of his community.
