Six candidates, three Republicans and three Democrats have filed for the position. This is the only county office which is contested in the primary.

Those seeking the Democrat nomination are M. Elizabeth Melvoy, Sycamore Township, deputy recorder: Russell L. Mewhorter, Salem Township trustee; and Carroll J. Searfoss, Richland Township trustee. Those seeking the Republican nomination are: Mrs. Janet Vogel, Wharton, Republican committeewoman; Mrs. Gatha Wise, Wharton, former Wyandot. County Realth Department clerk; and Mrs. Edna C. Huffman, Upper Sandusky,

Offices where there will be no formal competition in the primaries, but where a contest will take place in the fall are: Wyandot County Sheriff: A.M. (Tim) Swartz, presently chief deputy sheriff, has filed for the office of the Democrat ticket. Mark R. Kauble, also a deputy sheriff, has filed for the office on the Republican ticket

Two County commissioners are to be elected this fall. Curtis L. Meeker, route one, Upper Sandusky, and Willis Binau, presently serving on the board of commissioners, have filed for the positions on the Democrat ticket. Harry Gillilan, Route 1, Upper Sandusky, presently serving as a commissioner, and Harold E. Shuman, Upper Sandusky, have filed for the positions on the Republican ticket.

In addition to the above tax levies the Kenton School District voters will be asked to vote on a 2-mill tax levy for the purpose of constructing and - or acquisiof permanent improvements. This levy is for

a period of three years beginning with the 1968 tax duplicate. Residents in the Mar Vo Tech Joint Vocational School District will decide on a bond issue for the purpose of acquiring a site and erecting and equipping buildings for same. The bond issue is at the rate of .55 hundredths of a mill and for the issuance of \$2,235,000.00 in bonds to be paid off over a period of

These same voters will also be asked to vote on a 1.3 mill tax levy for the purpose of meeting current expenses for the above named district. This levy will be for a continuing period until removed by initiative referendum and would be placed on the 1968 tax duplicate.

The first highway to get the new surface treatment this spring is County 265 in Taylor Creek and Hale townships. The project is for T-35 for 312 miles at a cost of \$22,190 for the section from Route 292 to Ohio 273 on Road 265. Sometime this summer, the county will reach the 200-mile paving planned in 10 years, but actually will be completed in less than that



Harvard Awards Fellowship To **Dunkirk Student**

DENKIRK - Larry Stager son of Mr and Mrs Francis Stager, of Dunkirk, has been awarded a graduate prize fellowship for the 1968-69 academic year at Harvard University

Renewable for five years, the fellowship, which totals nearly \$20,000, is one of the largest offered by the graduate school of arts and sciences at Harvard. In June Mr Stager will

receive the master of theological studies from Harvard Divinity School and will be eligible for ordination in the ministry. In the fall, he will continue his graduate work toward a Ph. D. in Old Testament and Syro-Palestinian Archaeology with the new fellowship. In his third and fourth years, he will teach at Harvard in the Department of Near Eastern Languages and Literatures.

During the year's when the graduate prize fellowship is held as a non-teaching award, Mr. Stager will be carrying a full program of studies or be doing research in Israel on his doctoral thesis.

This summer, Mr. Stager will travel to Israel where he will be supervising part of the largescale archaeological excavations at Tell Gezer, a mound about 15 miles northwest of Jerusalem. He will continue digging up an ancient fortification, parts of which were unearthed last year, built by King Solomon. The work will continue
