Her California host reported that Mary Matz, 48, of Chicago said her husband had been ill and she had left her home after a dispute with members of her husband's family. He said her husband was Henry W. Matz, 86, formerly connected with a funeral home in Chicago.

Mrs. Matz started out from Toledo last Thursday with Paul Metz, 43, and Chet Reneau, 39, Black and White Cab Co. drivers. She gave the cab company a \$1,200 check for the trip and the drivers respected her request to keep her identity secret.

Mrs. Matz arrived Monday morning, after 50 driving hours, at the Richmond home of Mr. and Mrs. George Kehriotis. Mrs. Kehriotis is a niece of Mrs. Matz's husband.

Kehriotis reported Mrs. Matz needed medical attention and would see a doctor soon. Mrs. Matz told a reporter she was curled up in the taxi's back seat for most of the trip with her Chihuahua puppy, called Tiny Mouse.

### Refunds Going Out

WASHINGTON (AP) — More than 27 million tax refunds totaling \$3.5 billion had been mailed to taxpayers by the April 15 income tax filing deadline, the Internal Revenue Service said Tuesday.

About 65 per cent of the estimated 42 million refunds to be issued this year have already been mailed to taxpayers, IRS said. The remaining are expected to be processed within the next six weeks.
