BERLIN (AP) — The American eagle named "Willy Brandt," presented to West Berlin by U.S. Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy, has died of old age. Kennedy presented the eagle on a visit in 1962 and named it after the city's mayor because he said Brandt could be called the "Eagle of Berlin."

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Poitier Given Oscar, Cheers

'Long Journey', Many To Thank,' Says

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Sidney Poitier, the hymn-singing Baptist who helped nuns build a Catholic church in "Lilies of the Field," won a best actor Oscar Monday night to become the first negro to receive a top Academy Award.

Patricia Neal, the slatternly ranch housekeeper of "Hud," was named best actress of the year at the 36th annual Academy awards ceremonies at Santa Monica Civic Auditorium.

"Tom Jones," rollicking re-production of Henry Fielding's 18th century novel, scored as best picture and for best direction by Tony Richardson and for best adapted screen play by John Osborne.

Melvyn Douglas, the patriarchal Texas rancher of "Hud," was a surprise winner for best supporting actor. Margaret Rutherford, the dowdy dowager of "The V.I.P.s," was selected best supporting actress.

The auditorium erupted in cheers at the announcement of Poitier's victory. Wearing a

broad grin, he trotted up to the stage to accept his award from last year's winner, Anne Bancroft.

"Because it is a long journey to this moment," Poitier said, "I have many people to thank."

Poitier, born 37 years ago in Miami, Fla., one of nine children of a well-to-do Nassau tomato farmer, thanked his fellow creators of "Lilies of the Field" as well as Academy voters. He added: "To all of them all I can say is a very special thank you."

The only previous Negro actor winner was Hattie McDaniel who took best supporting actress honors for "Gone With the Wind" in 1939.

Miss Neal, whose first Hollywood career ended because producers said she didn't have sex appeal, is eight months pregnant and was unable to attend. The actress, born 38 years ago in the mining camp at Packard, Ky., lives in Buckinghamshire, England, with her husband, author Roald Dahl.

It was strictly old timers' night in the supporting performer category. Academy voters passed up the favorites, director-turned-actor John Huston and past winner Hugh Griffith, to name Douglas.

Born in Macon, Ga., 63 years ago, Douglas was a suave romantic hero of the early talkies and costarred with Greta Garbo in her last two films. His Oscar was received by fellow "Hud" performer, young Brandon De Wilde. Douglas is in Spain for a film.

Miss Rutherford, veteran of stage and films in her native England, was the strong favorite to win as best supporting actress. She was reported in London and her Oscar was accepted by fellow Britisher Peter Ustinov.

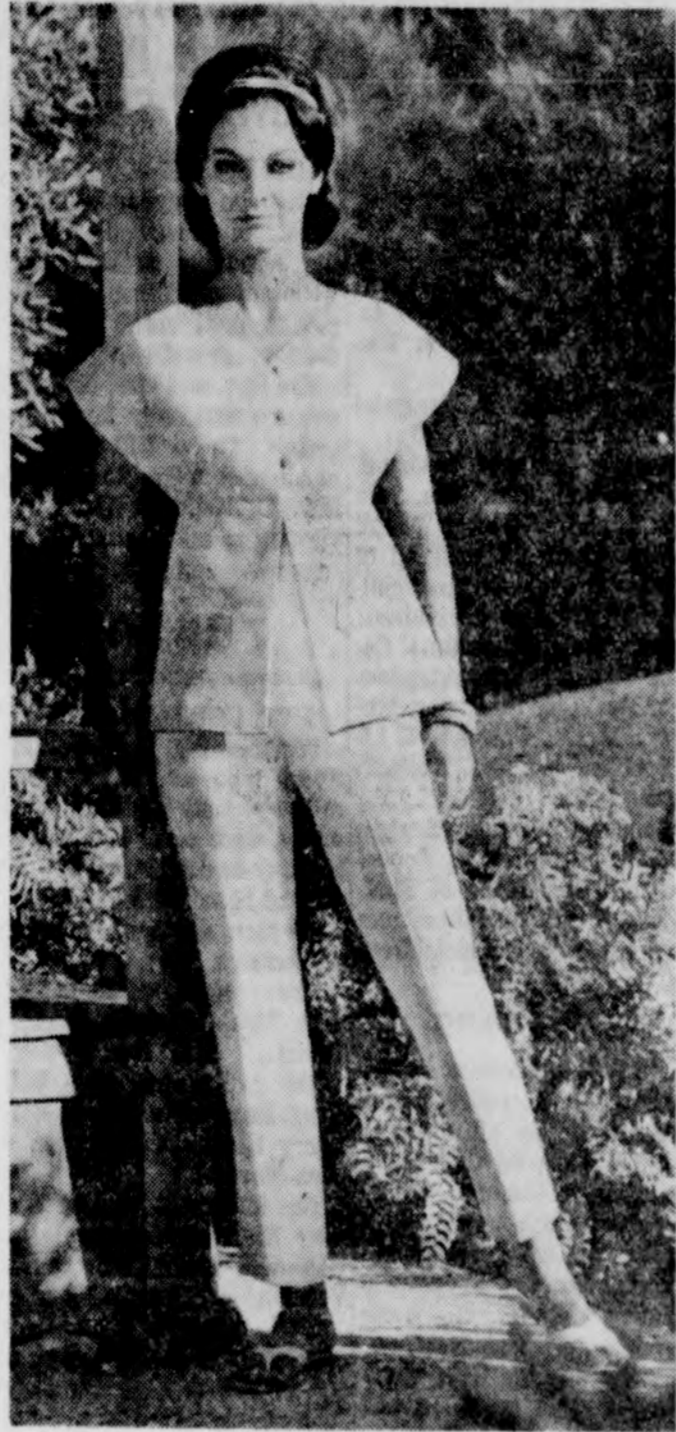

The bidding:

Opening lead—queen of clubs.

There are lucky hands in bridge as well as unlucky ones, but the best part of the game is finding a way of salvaging the unlucky hands.

Here is a typical case. South is declarer at four spades and West leads the queen of clubs. It is certainly unlikely that West has the ace, so South ducks the queen and also the jack and nine when West plays them next.

Declarer ruffs, of course, and is now faced with the possible loss of two diamond tricks if he finesses the queen and it turns out that East has the king.

So, rather than subject himself to this danger, let's say that declarer first draws three rounds of trumps and then plays the king and another heart, finessing the jack. If this finesse wins, he has his tenth trick, but it turns out that East takes the jack with the queen and returns the ace of clubs which South ruffs.

Now down to his last chance, declarer takes a diamond finesse, but the queen loses to the king and he goes down one. It is of course unlucky to find three cards—the ace of clubs, queen of hearts, and king of diamonds—all badly placed, but, nevertheless, the failure to make the contract should be
