Tech Center Picks Retailing Advisers

Philip Holstine, vice president and manager of The Leader, has been named chairman of an 11-member retail mid-management advisory committee at Lima Technical Center.

In announcing the appointment, Daniel Brown, center chairman, said the 11 local businessmen named to the committee will serve as advisers for a retailing study program expected to be offered when the center opens on OSU-Lima Campus next fall.

Other committee members include A. J. Hurak, vice chairman, manager of Montgomery Ward and Co.'s Lima store; Charles W. Amos, Woolworth Inc.'s Lima outlet manager; David Bradford, Rink's Bargain City manager; M.L. Brown said the technical center, a division of Penta County Technical College, has designed the retail mid-management program to prepare students for positions in retailing as assistants to the top executive levels. "Students of the program are placed in most every type of retailing establishment from department stores to specialty shops," Brown pointed out, "and are assigned according to each student's wants, needs and interests." Technical instruction of the program deals with marketing, merchandising and management of goods and services. Graduates of the two-year curriculum receive an associate degree in applied business, granted through the Ohio Board of Regents. Brown said high school graduates interested in enrolling in the course may contact the Lima Technical Center at 4300 Campus Dr. Helping direct the center's retailing program is Gary Pozsik, Penta dean of distributive education.

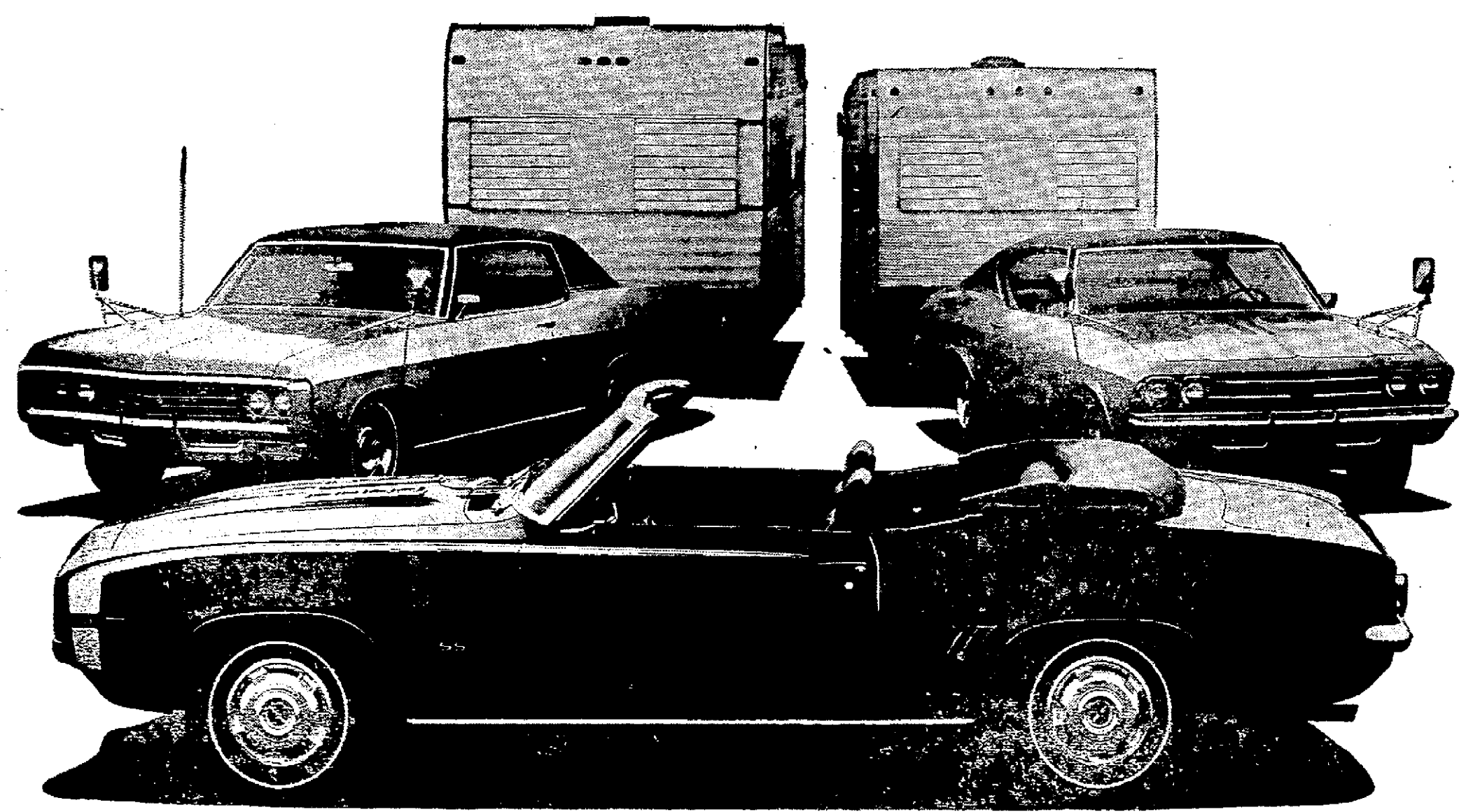
