## Gas Rate Increase In Effect

RUSSELLS POINT — Adjustment of gas rate hike which was effective Friday in Huntsville, Lakeview, Russells Point and West Liberty was passed on to the consumers by the Dayton Power and Light Company.

Jackson Center in Shelby County was also included in the communities in which an increase in natural gas rates was affected. The increase will be 1.5 cents per cubic foot, and the raise will be effective in both residential and commercial and industrial rates.

The Dayton Power and Light Co. was assented the increase April 5 by its supplier, the Ohio Fuel and Gas Co. The increase was made to Dayton Power and Light under bond which means, pending a Federal Power Commission ruling, it may be refunded to DP&L if the ruling is against the Ohio Fuel Gas Co.

The company reported the increase will mean five cents per month for customers cooking and heating water with gas, and about 25 cents per month for home heating customers. The increase to DP&L amounts to about \$675,000 annually.

Two previous raises are now being collected under bond and amount to about 5 cents per 1,000 cubic feet to the consumer. These are from April and May of 1959. These also are subject to refund.

## Old 'Salt' Is Sought

DAYTON, O. (UPI) — The Navy Reserve here is looking for an old salt.

The reservists want to find an ex-sailor who participated in the round-the-world cruise by the U.S. Navy in 1907.

Sixteen battleships participated in the cruise from Virginia to Japan and back in a show of force inspired by President Theodore Roosevelt.

Twelve thousand officers and men were aboard the ships. The fleet cruised down the South American coast and into the Pacific, then went to Japan, China and back to Hampton Roads, Va., two years later.

The Navy Reservists here want a veteran of the cruise to be a guest of honor in its Memorial Day parade.

## Lions Club Convention Set At Lake

RUSSELLS POINT — The District 13 D convention for Lions International will be held at Beatley's Hotel, Russells Point, Sunday.

Speaker will be Dudley L. Simms, immediate past president of Lions International. Simms served in the Association's highest office during the years 1958-59, and also served on the Board of International Relations during 1953-54. He has been awarded the Ambassador of Goodwill Citation.

When he was first chairman of the membership development and retention committee he developed a program which is being adopted by every club in the association. He originated the president's book "This is Your Year," which is a manual for club presidents.

During his year as international President, Simms traveled 200,000 miles in 75 countries on all six continents for the world.

At the convention there will be elected a district governor, a senior deputy governor and a junior deputy governor.

J. H. Gamel of Lakeview, senior deputy governor of District 13 D, will be one of the many guests who will be present at the convention hosted by the New Hampshire Lions Club.

## Jailed Man's New Sentence Suspended

A 29-year-old man currently in county jail because he drove a car during suspension of his driver's license narrowly missed an additional jail sentence yesterday.

Roger Stopher, 1807 Lenox, received a suspended jail sentence after pleading guilty in Municipal Court to a charge of failure to report an accident resulting in damage to real estate.

He is currently serving out a \$100 and costs and a 10-day jail sentence he received early last month after being found guilty of driving during suspension.

Yesterday he was taken from the jail to answer the charge filed by police following completion of investigation of an accident March 26.

Stopher admitted he was driving the car which drove through a picket fence at 1:10 a.m. March 26 and crashed into the side of the house at 852 St. Johns.

Police said a relative of Stopher had agreed to pay for damages to the house and fence totaling \$200.

Stopher received the suspended jail sentence on condition he be of good behavior and restitution was made for the damages.

## Findlay College Receives Grant

FINDLAY — A portion of the \$163,200 allocated to Ohio colleges and universities by the U. S. Steel Foundations, Inc., will be apportioned to Findlay College, it was announced recently. Officials announced that the exact amount of money to be received has not yet been announced.

Findlay College is one of those Ohio Institutions of Learning that will receive the aid to small colleges via the American College Fund.

Roger Blough, chairman of the board of the steel foundation announced that the 1960 program will encompass \$2,677,000 in total volume. Grants will be made to 710 Liberal Arts Colleges, universities and institutes and to 27 organizations devoted to elevation educational quality in America.

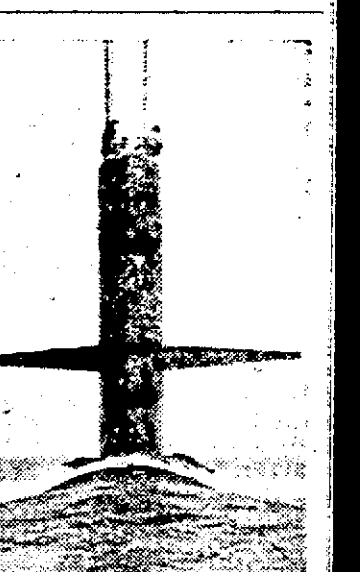
